
Principal's Report

Praise Day Survey

Thank you to the 48 people who responded to our Praise Day survey. This is a great response rate for our first newsletter based survey. We really appreciate your participation and your thoughts.

Of the 48 responders all but one thought that Praise Day should go ahead in 2018.


Would you support parents paying had the following result:



There were a variety of suggestions for Praise Day activities ranging from:

free, cheap and low key options such as mufti day, water play, treasure hunts, daytime disco or movie at school; to slightly more involved, with cost, options such as having a range of activities at school for students to choose from, having art or craft activites, having face painting, purchasing a range of special games that could be used just for Praise Days or having a scooter / bike day; to possibly out of school, more expensive options such as going to the movies, x-box van, waterslides or an off-site picnic day.

Is it fair if students miss out on Praise Day if they have been on a monitoring card - amber, red or brown at any time in the term had the following response:



Parents who indicated that they don't think this is fair made additional comments such as:

- everyone deserves to be given a second chance so they shouldn't miss out for just one misdemeanour
- I do think this is fair however, if a child has done
 well with their work in the classroom but been a
 bit naughty in the playground I feel that this
 should be overlooked. Praise day should be a
 reward for great work in the classroom.

Kids that are trying to improve there behaviour should be allowed to attend, not the kids that get into trouble once should have to miss out

It's not a true reward if everyone gets to participate... But maybe there could be a way for kids who are not repeat offenders (first time on monitoring card or doing something bad) to redeem themselves by completing a series of certain tasks like cleaning rubbish or helping others in the school or community in some way? These ideas together with the ideas from students will be taken to the PBL committee to discuss and devise a plan for next year. We will also take into consideration comments about being fair to ensure that we have a

system that continues to reward students for making good choices while recognising that everyone makes not so good choices occasionally.

We look forward to seeing the array of costumes at the BookWeek parade tomorrow. If comfortable, students can choose to wear their costume all day. Students can change into their uniform after the parade if preferred. 
Nominations will be accepted for the following roles: President, Vice President x 2, Treasurer, Secretary, Uniform Shop Convenor
